 tuition, and housing costs?**

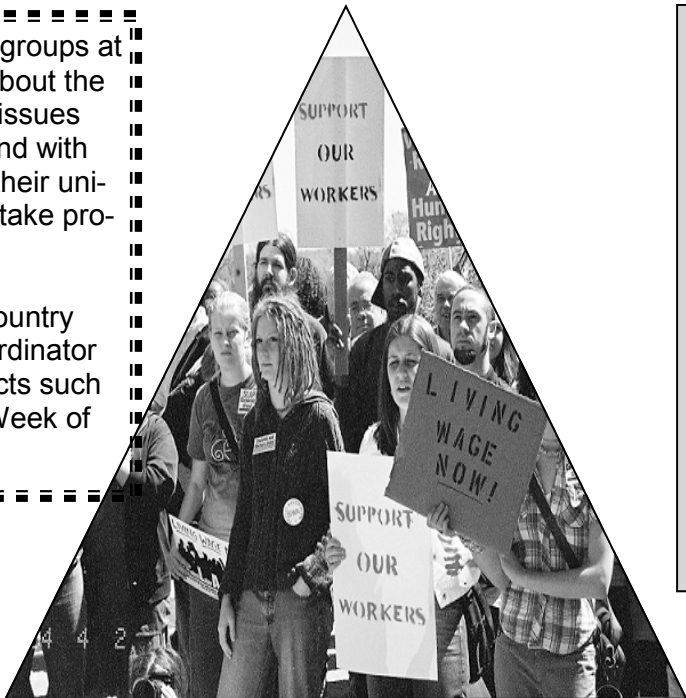

Student Labor Action Project groups at each school educate students about the links between higher education issues and labor justice, organize around with local labor struggles, and push their university Student Government to take progressive action.

Jobs with Justice coalitions connect and work with students on Local labor struggles by introducing them to community and faith allies. JwJ coalition also offer students resources to support their efforts and campaigns and link students to broader social justice movements through national opportunities like the US Social Forum and the national JwJ conference.

Student Government Associations can become official members of the U.S. Student Association (USSA) and work on organizing for students' rights. USSA also provides trainings for leadership development and encourages student activism on a broad set of social issues through its national conferences.
